Course Description: In this course, students will read the Romantic Poets of England during the Nineteenth Century. We will read Blake, Wordsworth, Shelley, Coleridge, Keats, and Lord Byron. The romantic poets were rebelling against the strict forms of neoclassical poetry. Instead of having a high literary style, romantic writers, like William Wordsworth, claimed that poetry could take as its subject children and country folk. Some of the romantics were interested in the supernatural. Samuel Taylor Coleridge's, The Rime of the Ancient Mariner, has supernatural themes, as does Keats's, The Eve of Saint Agnes. Percy Shelly, another romantic poet, claimed that poets are the unacknowledged legislatures of the world. Romantic poets were idealists and individualists. Some of them believed strongly in democratic principles. Wordsworth wrote about romantic poetry saying, "The objects of the Poet's thoughts are everywhere; though the eyes and senses of man are, it is true, his favorite guides, yet he will follow wheresoever he can find an atmosphere of sensation in which to move his wings. Poetry is the first and last of all knowledge—it is as immortal as the heart of man."

Course Objective: The students will study to the major poets of English Romanticism, looking particularly at the cultural, political, historical, and aesthetic aspects of the movement. Students will look closely at the tests of the poetry and write literary analyses of at least two poems from each author, as well as several exams.

Upon completion of the course, students will be able to

Write literary analyses of nineteenth century poets;

Write a research paper on a nineteenth century topic;
