this role, Dr. Briggs stated, "I am deeply honored to be selected as a member of the EPA's inaugural HBCU-MSI Federal Advisory Council. This opportunity to contribute to the intersection of education and environmental justice is a significant step toward ensuring that our communities, especially those at HBCUs and MSIs, are not only represented but also equipped to lead in environmental sustainability efforts."

The HBCU-MSI Federal Advisory Council, comprised of 20 distinguished leaders from various sectors, will provide independent advice to the EPA Administrator. The council identifies barriers to employment opportunities and nurtures future environmental leaders while ensuring that HBCUs and MSIs receive the necessary resources for continued success.

B.B. King 10th Annual Symposium at MVSU: A Milestone Success

On Sept. 4-5, 2024, the 10th Annual B.B. King Day Symposium was held at Mississippi Valley State University (MVSU) in tribute to the blues legend. The celebration kicked off with a dedicated lecture attended by MVSU students, faculty, and guests. Panel discussions explored the future of African Americans and the broader impact of blues culture on international audiences, including those from Europe.

The theme for this year's symposium, "The Next Generation of Blues

Artists," highlighted how contemporary musicians preserve the legacy of the blues while evolving its cultural narrative. Symposium Founder Dr. Alphonso Sanders has been a key figuere in this effort for over 25 years. He has traveled internationally, engaging with diverse audiences and showcasing a musical range that spans from ragtime to modern electric blues. Sanders is former chair of MVSU Fine Arts and former Director of the B.B. King Recording Studio.

"So, to be asked to come back is related to me starting a symposium 10

years ago as a tribute to B.B. King. And then I felt it an honor to continue the program after I left," Dr. Sanders expressed. He shared insights about B.B. King's life, recounting how the legend elevated the spirits of younger generations during his annual visits to Indianola, Miss. He emphasized that King was not only a musician but also an educated man committed to learning and advocating for African American rights through his art. "Blues is the thing that faced hurdles and threats," Sanders noted, but he remains optimistic about the future. He cited young musicians

like Kamasi Washington and Esperanza Spalding as examples of how the genres are being revitalized.

Event coordinator Margaret Clark remarked that King's legacy exemplifies music's power to bridge divides and unite people. During the lecture, Dr. Sanders performed "Triumph," showcasing the original blues instrument he discovered at MVSU. Mr. Webb also performed a harmonica piece, enriching the atmosphere.

During the Q&A session, Webb shared a poignant reflection, stating, "In

The Power of College Voters: Paving the way for possible historic change

The influence of young voters, particularly college students, is undeniable in shaping the political landscape of the United States. College campuses have long been hotbeds of political activism, playing a pivotal role in social and political movements throughout history.

Today, college students stand at the forefront of a unique opportunity: the potential to elect the first African American woman as President of the United States. Electing an African

American woman as president would shatter one of the highest glass ceilings, inspiring countless young women and people of color to pursue leadership roles in all sectors. According to a report from the Center for American Women and Politics (CAWP), although women have made significant gains in political representation, they remain underrepresented at all levels of government. For African American women specifically, the numbers are even more grim. According to Congress's own Congressional Research Service (CRS) report, updated Sept. 12, 2024, only 30 Black women are serving in the 118th Congress.

Moreover, African American women are already recognized as a crucial voting bloc. In recent elections, they have consistently shown some of the highest turnout rates among demographic groups. A 2016 study by the Pew Research Center revealed that 64% of eligible Black women voters participated in that year's election, showcasing their political engagement and influence. Electing an African American woman president would not only honor this legacy of engagement but would also affirm the growing power of women of color in shaping national policy.

College voters have the potential to transform the political landscape in unprecedented ways. By embracing the power of their vote, college students could be the generation to elect the first African American woman as President of the United States—a historic moment that would signal progress toward a inclusive and representative democracy.

Four MVSU students have been named ambassadors for the program:

Jouri Thornton, Jabari Johnson, Artaevian Epps and Ava Anderson. These student ambassadors will lead peer-to-peer financial education workshops and events covering topics such as budgeting, saving, credit, and debit management.

The SFEPD Student Ambassador Program goals are to embed financial education into college culture, expand SFEPD's reach, and create last financial literacy programs at HBCUs. It also seeks to help students make informed financial decisions improve retention and graduation rates, reduce loan defaults, and positively impact community financial habits.

Mississippi Valley State University Named Fulbright HBCU Institutional Leader by the U.S. Department of State

Mississippi Valley State University is proud to be named as a Fulbright Historically Black College and University (HBCU) Institutional Leader for 2024. Each year, the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs (ECA) recognizes the engagement of HBCUs with the Fulbright Program, the U.S. government's flagship international academic exchange program. MVSU has been recognized as the Fulbright HBCU Institutional leader for the fourth consecutive year since 2021.

Fulbright HBCU Institutional Leaders demonstrate noteworthy support for Fulbright exchange participants and encourage administrators, faculty and students at HBCUs to engage with Fulbright on campus. The Fulbright HBCU Institutional Leaders initiative highlights HBCUs as a destination for international students and scholars and showcases the deep intellectual tradition and proud

history of each to audiences abroad.

The announcement of the Fulbright HBCU Institutional Leaders was made on September 10, 2024 in advance of the 2024 Annual National HBCU Week Conference hosted by the White House Initiative on Advancing Educational Equity, Excellence, and Economic Opportunity through Historically Black Colleges and Universities.

Secretary of State Antony J. Blinken congratulated each HBCU Institutional Leader, saying this designation "is a testament to your institution's dedication to promoting global engagement and international understanding."

"MVSU's recognition as a 2024 Fulbright HBCU institutional leader for four (4) years straight is not only an honor but also speaks to the University's commitment to its mission," said Dr. Kathie Stromile Golden, Provost/ Senior Vice President of Academic Affairs. "More specifically this recognition



denotes our ongoing efforts to expose MVSU students, faculty and communities we serve to the Mississippi Delta and beyond. Indeed, the University's global footprint rivals those of larger institutions."

Dr. Lokesh Shivakumaraiah, Executive Director of International Programs, said, "The Office of International Programs continues to further strengthen collaboration with the Fulbright Program to promote curriculum and campus internationalization efforts at MVSU. Our partnership with the Fulbright Program has enabled us to continue

Dr. Lokesh Shivakumaraiah, Executive Director of the Office of International Programs, expressed deep enthusiasm for this new cohort of scholars by saying, "The Office of International Programs is excited to welcome our international visiting professors and scholars. OIP will continue to collaborate with Academic Affairs and Departments to internationalize the curriculum and campus." These visiting academics will be critical in enhancing MVSU's academic and cultural environment, offering unique insights and expertise from their respective fields and countries.

Among the distinguished group of scholars are:

Dr. Chung-Yung Chen (Taiwan) - Fulbright Faculty: Dr. Chen is a Fulbright Scholar-in-Residence specializing in bioinformatics, will be contributing as a Bioinformatics faculty to MVSU's growing emphasis on scientific research and innovation.

Cristina Rascón Castro (Mexico) - Spanish Professor: Ms. Castro is a Spanish Visiting Professor and brings in extensive cultural experience in Latin American literature and Spanish language instruction. Ms. Castro said, "It is an honor and great pleasure to join the Mississippi Valley State University. 
Other artists' line-up included: Rising Star Fife and Drum Band, Pat Thomas, Kattawar Brothers,
